This conflict,
called The Problem of Evil,
is something all Christians ponder
at some point in their lives.

# **First Things**

The Problem of Evil is both a head and a heart issue.
 This truth influences how I respond when people share it.

 It involves both Moral Evil (human choice) and Amoral Evil (things beyond our control, e.g., natural disasters, illness).

We are scratching the surface of a conversation that is centuries old.

#### **Guidelines for Holy Conversation**

"Be quick to listen, slow to speak, slow to anger" (St. James)

- --Our goal is to truly hear each other's thought and feelings (rather than debate to be "right")
- --We can learn by "trying on" another person's understanding or experience


"Speak the truth in love" (St. Paul)

- --Speak as we wish to be spoken to (It's not what we say, it's how we say it)
- --Remember to respect the dignity of every human being (Baptismal promise)

"To everything there is a season...A time to speak...and withhold speech (Ecclesiastes)


- --We don't have to say what we're not comfortable saying
  - -- Try not to interrupt, or dominate the conversation

### Five Ways to Deal with the Problem

#### 1. God is not All-Powerful


- There is an ongoing battle between Good and Evil in which God does not, for now, have complete control. God <u>cannot</u> stop bad things from happening to good people.
- -- This is similar to Christ's "self-emptying" in Philippians 2.
- -- This understanding is often connected with the idea of Free Will.





#### 2. God is not Good

God is All-Powerful


**Good People** 

God can stop bad things from happening, since God is All-Powerful;


but

God allows bad things happen because God isn't that interested in people, or

God makes bad things happen because God is cruel.



# 3. "Bad Things" aren't Really Bad




- Eventually, "everything happens for a reason". ("It's all part of God's plan.") We just don't understand why yet, so things seem bad.
- -- Buddhism: The Caterpillar and the Rug
- -- Hamlet: "There is no good or bad; thinking makes it so."



#### 4. There is No God





**Bad Things** 



- Since bad things happen to good people, it doesn't make sense to believe in an all-powerful, loving God.
- -- This view could lead one to Agnosticism, rather than Atheism.




# 5. It's a Holy Mystery



- We simply admit that the mind of God is beyond our comprehension.
- Sometimes, but not always,understood as"Everything happens for a reason".

# Simply put

Scripture: What does <u>The Bible</u> say about it?

• Tradition: What does <u>The Church</u> say about it?

Reason: What makes sense to me? What has experience taught me?

# The "Three-Legged Stool" seeks to avoid theological extremes:

• Biblicism: The Bible says it, I believe it, that settles it.

• Traditionalism: We've never done it that way before.

Rationalism: If I can't see it, I won't believe it.
